#### Summary and Background Information

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund.

The federal ARP statute requires that States reserve ARP ESSER funds for three State-level reservations for evidence-based activities and interventions that respond to students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children and youth in foster care, and migratory students.

- Not less than 5 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, activities to address the academic impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions.
- Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs.
- Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive after-school programs.

The 2021-2022 enacted New York State budget fully allocated the required SEA reserves as subgrants to 398 LEAs and NYSED has made allocations to two additional LEAs. Specific LEA allocations are detailed in Columns D, E, and F in the **ARP ESSER Allocations Chart** (see also in the Document Library). Please note that these funds are in addition to the *90% LEA ARP-ESSER ALLOCATION* listed in Column C of that workbook and must be budgeted for separately.

As indicated in NYSED's approved **ARP ESSER State Plan**, NYSED has included within this application a list of evidence-based interventions related to each state reserve. Students in these studies have not been randomly assigned, but researchers have used statistical matching methods that allow them to speak with confidence that the strategy results in an improved outcome. These studies meet the What Works Clearinghouse evidence

standards with reservations. The studies use large, multi-site samples. No other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.

- Tier 3 Promising Evidence: Supported by at least one well designed, well implemented correlational study with statistical controls for selection bias. There is evidence that this strategy improves a student outcome (reading scores, attendance rates), but that research may consist of correlational studies -- studies that can show a relationship between the strategy and outcome but cannot show that the improved outcome was the result of the strategy. The studies supporting Tier 3 strategies do not have to be based on large, multi-site samples. A strategy that would otherwise be considered Tier 1 or Tier 2, but it does not meet the sample size requirements, is considered Tier 3. No other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.
- Tier 4 Demonstrates a Rationale: High-quality research findings or positive evaluation suggests that this will likely improve student outcomes or other relevant outcomes; and there are ongoing efforts to examine the effects of such activity, strategy, or intervention. Based on existing research, the intervention cannot yet be defined as a Tier 1, Tier 2 or Tier 3. However, there is good reason to believe based on existing research and data that the intervention could improve relevant student outcomes.

#### Plan Development & Dissemination

The Canastota Central School District included <u>all</u> constituents when developing the ARP ESSER Plan by engaging all through the use of social media tool Facebook, School Messenger and our website. Due to COVID-19 we engaged our community through the use of BOE meetings, and building based meetings as well as district-wide meeting using Google Meet. We surveyed our constituents and used the data collected to share back with a crafting team. Further, all staff in the district who service students with disabilities, English Learners, and students experiencing homelessness, migrant, foster care and incarcerated youth were given the opportunity to engage in conversation for ARP Funds to support programs to address the unique needs of these students. In addition each building principal at the building level discussed with their constituents to gather ideas based on needs specific to the building data for students served. Climate surveys were completed by community, faculty and staff administered by Canastota Central School District to provide us with data to further support our decision making.

The plan is fluid with the flexibility to change over time depending on the needs of the students. The District will continue to evaluate the needs and assess them on an ongoing basis with the stakeholders/community. All stakeholders/community will have an opportunity continue to discuss what programs are working and which ones that need any possible changes.

The process/plan will be evaluated every 6 weeks within each building level to measure the effectiveness of the interventions. We will continue to have surveys and public sessions to go over the results and adjust if necessary. We know that things may need to be adjusted and reworked but we need to see how the additional staff can help change the course of the grading for our students who have endured such learning loss. That is why we went very heavy with staffing in academic and SEL needs of the students. We will use data to monitor progress and evaluate benchmark data. SEL inventories will also be utilized with survey data to gain more insite in to where are students are at in respect to SEL needs.

The district will convey to the parents and families through written communication the student's specific needs which have been identified through several measures. These letters will be mailed out during the initial grouping of identified students. Parents and families will receive both math and ELA progress reports which indicate specific standards that have been mastered through the intervention and those skills that are still being addressed.

In addition to the resources supplied in the classrooms, parents and families will be supplied with several resources to address student needs from home. One example is access to stories relating to on grade level content from the CKLA (Core Knowledge Language Arts) program. Students will also have access to ELA expeditionary learning resources, which have been uploaded to google classroom. In the area of math fluency, parents and students have been supplied with usernames and passwords to access the Zearn and Reflex programs from home, which focus on basic math fluency and concepts.

Canastota CSD determines SEL and academic needs for all students with diagnostics, universal screeners (BIMAS), ongoing formative assessments with all grade levels, collaberating with our school resource officer, school psychologists, social workers and counselors, informal and formal observations, information shared by families and caregivers and by establishing positive relationships with all stakeholders. Students disproportinately impacted by the pandemic are discussed and monitored with several stakeholders including administration.

Canastota will have home visits, support meetings, counseling sessions and many other ways to communicate to discuss any needs. We can also use virtual meetings as another form of communication.

In order to determine student need and monitor student progress, the district will collect evidence through teacher observations, quarterly assessments and universal screenings as well as state and local assessments. These screenings include AimsWeb Plus, Renaissance Star Reading, Renaissance Star math, and local diagnostic tools such as P.A.S.T (Phonological Awareness Screening Test), and QPS (Quick Phonics Screener).

Using the above mentioned screeners, students with specific needs will be identified and appropriate interventions will be recommended and implemented. These interventions include Road to the Code, Road to Reading, Rewards intermediate and Secondary Reading Intervention and Reflex by Explore Learning.

The interventions will be supported by Academic Intervention Service providers who will deliver direct explicit instruction. The instructional specialists will provide professional development for the interventions and also support and implement research based strategies, perform routine walkthroughs and provide feedback based on observations.

Data based decision making training and overview of teaming. (all grade levels) Focus on defining universal screening/progress monitoring and intensifying interventions for instructional decisions.

The HIgh school teachers met after school to create and adjust a pacing calendar.Due to lost instructional time, students began the year with several gaps in learning, making it difficult (particularly in math) to build on concepts and continue with current content. This group met to adjust the pacing calendar to ensure that the grade level curriculum was in alignment with the scope and sequence while simultaneously addressing any deficits. As remediation is embedded in the lessons, often future lessons have to be addressed and possibly merged in order to address the entire curriculum for the grade level. This has been an ongoing process for the high school teachers.

The South Side and Roberts Street teachers are attending Reflex intervention training. The Reflex program is focused on math fluency. Teachers have reported significant loss in recall for addition, subtraction and multiplication facts. This program will give individualized instruction to students based on an initial assessment.
