A Message from the Superintendent

I hope everyone had a very happy and healthy New Year! The beginning of a New Year always brings about renewed goals and aspirations. Our District continues to strive toward excellence in all areas. Here are a few updates of our progress as we start 2015:

- The 2015-16 School Budget: As we move into the winter months, the Board of Education, Cara Stevens, School District Business Leader, administrators and I will be working on creating the 2015-16 budget. As always, it is our goal to prepare a fiscally sound budget; one that provides the best possible education for each and every one of our students at a means and level that is fiscally responsible to our taxpayers. We will be sharing information about the proposed budget soon. Thank you for all of your support in advance.
- Capital Project: Roofing designs were submitted to the State Education Department in late October and are awaiting approval. The Facilities Interviewing Committee met and interviewed a number of prospective candidates for the Construction Manager position to oversee the Capital Project. The Board of Education approved a Construction Management Services contract at the January 13th board meeting and the position was offered to the Watchdog Building Partners. Watchdog will now oversee the Capital Project and start to put out bids to sub-contractors following the State Education Department's approval. In addition, science classroom design meetings for the JSHS have begun with our architects, King and King. The first two meetings gathered initial visioning goals and established the beginning of a design plan.

Frogs Welcomed to Third Grade

Great things are happening in third grade at South Side Elementary School! Ms. Galuski's class has welcomed three African Dwarf Frogs into the classroom. The second module of the third grade ELA curriculum is all about frogs. Students are excited to have real frogs to interact with and observe this year. Studying live frogs will support their instruction as they read a variety of texts about the amphibians.



The frog project originated last year as a student-driven initiative. Third graders persuaded their teacher and principal that they should have frogs as classroom pets. Students then researched different species of frogs to determine which one would be the best pet. African Dwarf Frogs were selected because they are active, fully aquatic and can be cared for similarly to goldfish. Funding for the frog project was provided by a grant from Pets in the Classroom, which paid for a tank and supplies along with the frogs.

In addition to supplementing their studies, students learn responsibility and compassion by caring for classroom pets. Watching the frogs is also a fun way for students to relax and relieve stress during the day. One student per week serves as the "Frog Friend", responsible for feeding the frogs and supervising their environment. The previous helper trains the new helper, instilling self-confidence and a sense of ownership and pride. All students know that the frogs are counting on them for their well-being and they are sensitive to their pets' needs.

Anonymous Tip Line

In an ongoing effort to promote a safe learning environment, the District will provide each of our families with a complimentary anonymous tip line magnet. This magnet is the product of collaboration between the District, the

Canastota Police Department, our School Resource Officer and our Art Department. A former student, April Swanson, created the design.

The purpose of the tip line is to allow students the ability to share information anonymously regarding issues, which may put others'

safety in danger. Students can report information about drugs, weapons, alcohol, violence and bullying or any threat to safety. While this can be done anonymously, the more information a student gives (including ones name), the greater the ability the District has to

do a complete investigation and resolve the situation quickly.

Please remember that this tip line DOES NOT replace 911 in cases of emergencies. It shouldn't be used in emergency situations where

immediate action is needed. The tip line is a non-emergency information-gathering tool used as another means to keep our schools safe.

Please display in a place easily accessible to your children. Phone calls will be taken during the day, while phone messages will be taken after 5:00 pm.

Text messages can be sent anytime.

This is another measure to improve the safety of our school community and supervision of our students. Thank you for your continued support in helping us to provide a safe learning environment for our children.

Two CHS Teachers Selected as Microsoft Innovative Educator Experts

Special Education teacher Robert Stokes and Business teacher Patricia Ragan have been selected by Microsoft as Microsoft Innovative Educator Experts (MIE Experts) for 2015 for their excellence in using technology to help students learn and achieve more – and ultimately succeed in a mobile-first, cloud-first world.

Currently in Mr. Stokes' Common Core Algebra class, students are using probability and linear relationships to evaluate evidence and to determine if a Bigfoot could be found in Canastota. The students have collaborated with outside experts on the topic and will be using that information to supplement the data that they have collected. The students will be using Minecraft to create

virtual Bigfoot search expeditions and will be sharing their overall findings via Youtube.com.

"Being selected as a MIE Expert is an amazing honor," said Robert Stokes. "I look forward to continue finding innovative ways to equip students with the proper tools needed to succeed in the new world of work."

The learning activity Mrs. Ragan designed is called *Globalizing 21st Century careers via Skype*. For the project students were required to research a 21st century career, such as ethical hacking, and determine the history of the career, current conditions of the career and forecast the future for the career. As a capstone, students communicated with students in Sweden regarding trends and opportunities created by technology.

"I am honored to be selected as a MIE Expert and look forward to representing Canastota globally," said Ragan. "I look forward to continuing to find innovative ways to prepare students for 21st century careers through designing learning activities."

Each year, Microsoft selects MIE Experts to be part of an exclusive global community that is paving the way for their peers to share ideas, try new approaches and learn from each other. This year, Microsoft selected more than 800 thought leaders in innovative learning who possess technology and desire to amplify their reach and voice.


Life Cycle Studies in Second Grade

The second grade students at South Side have begun their study of life cycles. Mr. Jack Gramlick came to present some of the unique characteristics of the life of a salmon. Second graders will be raising 75 eggs that are the size of the eraser on the end of a pencil. These eggs will be developing in a fish tank that has been placed in a refrigerator, giving the eggs a habitat that is similar to what they would have outside. The students will be able to observe their growth each week. They will be calculating the temperature units each day based on the temperature of the water. When it reaches 840 temperature units, the eggs should have developed into their next stage and they will be released into Canastota Creek. This usually happens mid-April. Please ask your child to describe the changes that they see in the Atlantic Salmon throughout this time period.



Winter Fun in Pre-K

The students in Pre-K had a very busy December! Parents, children and staff collected holiday gifts for the animals at Wanderers' Rest. A representative from the shelter was able to visit with two furry friends just before our holiday

Giving our students this opportunity helps with this growing issue. Snowshoeing is a low impact activity that helps to build overall strength, endurance, and balance. Kindergarten Registration for the 2015-2016 School Year

The Canastota Central School District is preparing for Kindergarten Registration for the 2015-2016 school year. All resident students born on or before December 1, 2010, are eligible to register for Kindergarten for the 2015-2016 school year. Children must be five years old on or before December 1, 2015 to qualify.
