Letter from the Superintendent

Fall is a season of change and thankfulness. We have much to be grateful for here in the village of Canastota. The Canastota School District has enjoyed many meaningful events this fall including the passing of a Capital Project, hosting the Special Olympics, a spectacular Homecoming Weekend and the Wall of

The District wishes to sincerely THANK all of our parents, staff and community members who supported the Capital Maintenance Project. The recent vote for the Capital Project was passed with a 69% approval rate. The continued support of our community is very much appreciated and allows the district to move forward with necessary repairs and renovations. Since the project was approved by voters, our architects, King and King, developed and submitted design plans to the New York State Education Department. While we await the State's approval of the plans, the District will hire a construction manager, and conduct bids to determine the contractors that will work on this project. During the summer of 2015 we will work on partially replacing the roof at the Roberts Street Complex and replacing the roof of the Education Annex/Bus Garage. The rest of the Capital Project work will start the summer of 2016. Capital project related work includes: PSES - window replacement and flooring upgrades; SSES - some window replacement, flooring, ventilation and plumbing upgrades; RSES- partial roof replacement, ventilation upgrades, rest room renovations (high school gym lobby) and science wing renovations; Education Annex/Bus Garage- roof replacement.

Canastota Schools hosted the annual Special Olympics Autumn Games on October 3rd. Districts from all over Madison and Oneida Counties, including the districts of Madison-Oneida BOCES, Oneida, Madison, Hamilton, Morrisville-Eaton, Stockbridge, Chittenango, Camden, Cazenovia, Vernon-Verona, Sherrill and of course, Canastota, were in attendance. It was a wonderful occasion with over 300 student athletes participating in such track and field events as the softball throw, shot putt,

running long jump, standing long jump, and distance races. The District would like to thank Mr. Andy Pino, Athletic Director, Ms. Carolyn Rose, Director of Special Programs and all the administrators, teachers, coaches, staff, students and family members who worked hard to make this an extremely successful event.

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Character Education in Action




Social Worker Shorts


