This summer, crews were able to complete the first phase of the District's Capital Project. If approved, work on the second phase of the project will begin next summer and will include replacing windows and upgrading floors at Peterboro Street Elementary School; replacing some windows, upgrading floors, plumbing and ventilation at South Side Elementary School; performing ventilation upgrades at Roberts Street Elementary School; and upgrading the science wing and doing renovations on rest rooms in the gym lobby area of the Junior-Senior High School.

Mathematics MAGIC

Atlas lets district staff collaborate on curriculum, share best practices Fifth-graders at Roberts Street Elementary School are learning mathematics, getting some exercise and having fun, thanks to the work of teachers and instructional staff during the summer months.

The Roberts Street teachers, along with mathematics teachers across the district, began working with Rubicon Atlas, a web-based curriculum-mapping program that allows teachers to be invested in the curriculum they are teaching. Jessica Fox, who teaches fifth grade at RSES, said using Atlas makes it easy for teachers to

collaborate.



"We pooled our resources and then took five days to talk about what we do. Everyone shared ideas and strategies. Doing that has given us more tools for teaching," Mrs. Fox said.

Atlas lets teachers post lessons, modules, ideas and includes a teaching calendar.

"That allows us to stay with each other across the grade so students in one class are not way ahead or way behind," Mrs. Fox said.

She and her fellow teachers meet once a week to discuss what is working and what isn't but that doesn't mean they wait to share ideas.

"We can share what we find with each other right away on Rubicon," Mrs. Fox said.

Jason Mitchell, Canastota's Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction, said English Language Arts teachers are the next group that will start using the Rubicon system.

"We wanted teachers to be invested in, and, feel like they had ownership of the curriculum," Mr. Mitchell said. "This does that because it gives them a long-term, viable document to work from and creates consistency."

Mrs. Fox believes that teaching mathematics this way is good for her students.

"It will have a positive effect for students in future years," she said. "Students are seeing that there is more than one way to learn something."

Mr. Mitchell said that the system allows teachers to use their professional judgment when it comes to creating lessons, while still ensuring that what they teach aligns with the required state standards.



"Teachers populate the system using modules from the New York State Education Department as a starting point," Mr. Mitchell said.

He said one of the greatest benefits of this system is that it allows for adaptability and change.

"Teachers can be more nimble. This makes adjustments year to year much easier," he said.

The plan is to review student performance each year and make sure the curriculum is in alignment with what the students need to learn to be prepared to move to the next grade level, Mr. Mitchell said.

"Ultimately we want to use this in all subject areas."

Therapy Dog Comes to School

Canastota Junior/Senior High School has a new, four-legged staff member!

Fonzie, a three-year-old Australian labradoodle, will work with School Psychologist Brenda Jenkins as part of the new PAWS PACK program (Pets Assisting Willing Students Positively Affecting Canastota Kids).

Fonzie has a fleece coat, which means he has hair, not fur. He sheds very little, making him a good dog to have around for those with allergies to dog dander. Last November, Fonzie earned his Canine Good Citizen (CGC) certificate, which shows he has a high level of obedience and behavior training. While in school, he will be on a leash at all times and under the direction of his handler, Mrs. Jenkins.

The PAWS PACK program, which was approved by the Board of Education, allows Fonzie to work with students in grades 8-12. As a therapy dog, Fonzie gives unconditional, nonjudgmental support and comfort to students in need. This can include: comfort in school counseling services, calming during tests, student conflicts and crisis situations; listening to students read books aloud; and acting as a positive incentive for improved behavior and attendance in school.

Working with Fonzie is strictly voluntary. He and Mrs. Jenkins will only work with students and staff members who have expressed an interest. Students who have ongoing contact with Fonzie need signed parental consent to do so. Parents who have additional questions or concerns can call Mrs. Jenkins in the PPS Office at 697-8805.

CHS Students Share Stories


Students in Kelley Brenon's Creative Writing class started the school year off by writing children's books. They then took the time to share them with some first graders at Peterboro Street Elementary School.

Fall Sports Roundup

Girls Soccer: Led by Coach Stacey Snow the girls finished with an overall record of 4-11-1 and enjoyed their best season in more than a decade.

Boys Soccer: Coach Rollin Reed guided the Raiders to a 10-8 season. The Raiders opened Section III competition with a 4-0 win against Adirondack but were defeated by No. 1 seed Lowville in the quarterfinals.

Girls Tennis: The varsity girls tennis team had a rebuilding year with an overall record of 4-12 and a league record of 4-10. The highlight of the year was a 4-1 victory over defending league co-champion Clinton. The singles line-up of Cristina Damiano, Dominique Cesario, and Crystal VanOrnam had a winning record in singles matches. The doubles players, Kaileigh Becker, Julianna McQuaid, Makayla Larue, Skyler Donley, and Payton Shirley, showed great improvement over the course of the season.

Field Hockey: The Field Hockey team finished second behind Morrisville-Eaton-Hamilton in the Class C West Division. Under the direction of coach Marcia Laidlaw, the girls enjoyed an outstanding season going 12-2-1. They were seeded No. 2 in Class C Sectional competition losing to Little Falls 4-1 in the semifinals. The Raiders were led by Josey Sgarlata and Shelby Kilts.

Cross Country: The boys team finished fourth and the girls were third in the league. Adam VanValkenburgh had a strong year, taking first in races at Rome Free Academy and at the Adirondack Championships. He is currently ranked among the top 10 runners in Class C in NYS. Raiders Win Class C West

The hard work in the off-season has paid off for the Canastota varsity football team. The Canastota Raiders have had an amazing 2015 season and are ranked #13 in Class C by the New York State Sportswriters Association.

The Raiders were crowned Class C West Champions and on Nov. 7th wtill compete for the Section III Championship against Notre Dame in the Carrier Dome. This will only be the second time in school history that Canastota football has made it to the sectional finals.

Leading the way for the Raiders has been Ryan Zophy who has rushed for 1302 yards scoring 16 touchdowns while passing for 764 yards. Running back Cameron Bellino has also performed well, scoring nine touchdowns and leading a stout Raider defense in tackles.

Mike Zupan is Canastota's top receiver with 25 receptions for 425 yards. He has also scored on both kickoff and punt returns and has had several interceptions this season.

A brand new scoreboard was installed for the team earlier this season.

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Children's Council News

The Canastota Children's Council has started planning for an upcoming drama production.

The group will present "Into the Woods Jr.," on Friday, April 15, 2016 and Saturday, April 16, 2016. Auditions for roles will be held from 4 to 7 p.m. Jan. 6, 2016. Students in grades 4-8 are encouraged to try out for parts in the musical.

Canastota Awarded \$10,000 Grant

The Monsanto Fund has given the Canastota Central School District a \$10,000 grant for an aquaponics project at the high school.

BOCES grant writer, Lisa Seitz, Canastota students will have access to a new aquaponics system in the greenhouse. This system will provide hands-on learning opportunities that enhance math and science curriculum for students across all grade levels in the district.

The project will allow our students to monitor, care for and maintain an aquaponics system that will use fish, in our case tilapia, to produce a number of edible plants for harvest. The system will expand and enhance existing greenhouse and agricultural resources at our school. It will also serve to enhance hands-on, practical learning experiences in several disciplines, including agriculture science, technology and business.

The project will give Canastota students a chance to put their mathematics skills to use by designing the system's layout. As the year progresses, the students will collect data, take digital pictures and use water-quality test kits to document the progress of the system. Students enrolled in business classes will support the aquaponics operation and gain agribusiness management experience.
