### Canastota Entry Stands Out at NYS History Day Competition

Three Canastota students traveled to Cooperstown to participate in the New York State History Day competition in late April. The trio of sophomores qualified to compete at the state level after appearing at the Central New York History Day Competition in March.

Dominique Cesario, Makayla LaRue and Danielle McCallops performed a spoken word titled "S.A.M.E. – South Africans Made Equal," at the Otesaga Resort in Cooperstown. The performance highlighted the legacy and leadership of Nelson Mandela, which was the theme of the competition. It focused on the role Mr. Mandela played in the struggle against apartheid in South Africa. The audience and judging panel responded positively to the entry and the judges' said the trio were "poised," "confident," and "great performers," and referred to their performance as "unique," "well-executed," and an "excellent portrayal of emotion."

While in Cooperstown the group and their chaperone, Mrs. Ronalds, visited the National Baseball Hall of Fame, the Fenimore Art Museum and the Farmer's Museum. Mrs. Ronalds and Dominique Cesario shared information about the trip with the Canastota Board of Education at their May 26 meeting.

### Stop Summer Learning Loss

When we think of summer, we think of a happy, carefree time when children can have fun and unwind. Sometimes, however, we forget about the potential learning opportunities. Here are some ways to prevent summer slide from author and education blogger Dr. Matthew Lynch.

- Reading Program: Set up a summer reading program with your child in which s/he chooses an agreed-upon number of grade-level books to read per month. Make sure that you consult the child's teacher or a librarian for advice.
- Learning While Vacationing: If you are planning on taking a vacation this summer, you can turn it into a social studies activity. Ask your child to research the destination's history, cuisine, popular attractions, etc. Also, once you reach your vacation destination, you can schedule tours of famous landmarks and locations, which will increase social studies knowledge.
- Summer Journaling: Ask your son or daughter to write a daily journal of all the things learned each day. Remember, you will need to orchestrate learning activities for your children, because you can't trust that they will be able to do it on their own.
- Turn Daily Activities Into Learning Opportunities: If you're at the grocery store with your kids, challenge them to add up the total cost of your purchase. Driving to grandmother's house? Ask them to find certain colors, shapes, or patterns along the way.
- Learning Locally: Don't forget about the local parks, museums, zoo, aquarium, etc. The community is full of fun activities that can be turned into learning opportunities.
