As we head further into the fall semester, it's tough to know where to start my update to the Canastota school community. In all of my years working in a school, I don't think I've seen a year where so many significant events have converged all at once — the continuation of the COVID pandemic, work associated with a major capital project, significant initiatives in the area of curriculum and instruction, and the introduction of some innovative community partnerships that will increase connections between the school and the larger community. No doubt about it, there's a lot going on.

Without question, COVID has dominated the conversation as the new school year began. While it has continued to cause disruptions, we've been able to navigate through the challenges thanks to the exceptional work of our staff members and the cooperation of our families. We continue to work closely with the Madison County Health Department to minimize the spread of COVID within the school, and we have successfully introduced weekly testing where necessary. We've learned a lot while dealing with COVID, and one of the most important lessons is that no matter what the challenge, we need to find a way to get positive things done in our school community. We will continue to work with all of the resources available to us as we battle this disease. Fortunately, there will be a point when COVID will not dominate our daily routines as it currently does, and when that day finally comes, we'll be stronger than ever.

One way to make sure we continue to grow as a school community is to ensure that we share important information with all of our stakeholders. This fall, we embarked on a new initiative to do just that by launching an ongoing series of parent/community sessions designed to provide important information to our school community. Our first session was held in late September – at the pavilion at the International Boxing Hall of Fame – and the focus was squarely on the unique opportunities available to our families through exciting new partnerships with a variety of community partners. Our badging and micro-credentialing initiative is now fully underway, and we will continue to offer additional sessions on this important subject in case you didn't have a chance to catch last month's overview. Our capital project continues to move along and will continue throughout the remainder of this school year. Along with major infrastructure updates — including extensive roofing work, plumbing and electrical and security enhancements — we were pleased to debut our brand new all-purpose athletic field during the halftime ceremony of our recent Homecoming football game. It was exciting to welcome back former soccer, field hockey, cheerleaders and football players as we celebrated our new field that will benefit these teams moving into the future (along with physical education classes on a daily



District Unveils Ambassador Badge at New Community Forum

The Canastota School District has launched a new Educational Leadership Series aimed at informing local residents and businesses about district efforts and increasing community engagement with school.

The community forum, held at the International Boxing Hall of Fame, allowed district leaders to debut a new collaboration with the Hall of Fame to support the career-readiness work of high school students. The Event Ambassador Badge program provides an opportunity for students in grades 9-12 to assist IBHOF with its major Hall of Fame Weekend and Induction Ceremony in June. Along the way, students will learn about local history, sport industry, communication, event planning, business operations and leadership, meeting specific goals in each area to earn small credentials on their way to earning the culminating Event Ambassador Badge.

"These credentials are all stackable, so even if a student doesn't finish the whole program, they have something that shows what they have accomplished and what they can achieve," said Liz Garofalo, the Coordinator of Innovative Learning, who designed the badging initiative. "Employment skills are built right into the work for each badge."

More than 70 students have already signed up to participate in the program. Several of them attended the formal announcement event and had an opportunity to step inside the famous boxing ring used for the 1971 Ali-Frazier match.





The program is part of a larger, districtwide Canastota Connects badging initiative that has been rolled out at different grade levels since 2020. The initiative allows students to work independently to complete different activities to show mastery in various topics, such as demonstrating good character, leadership development, goal setting and community service. Different badges are available at different age levels and are completed in an age-appropriate way, with completed badges following students throughout their school career in a digital portfolio.

The Event Ambassador Badge, and each of its component badges, are among those credentials that students can show to colleges and employers to demonstrate their skills. It also furthers the partnership between the IBHOF and the district, following the Hall of Fame hosting the CHS 2021 Commencement in June.

"Our relationships with the school has always been fantastic but this takes it a step further and it's going to be exciting," IBHOF Executive Director Ed Brophy said.



For the badge announcement at the Educational Leadership Series meeting, students, parents, district leaders and community members attended to learn more about the program and the series itself. The monthly series will feature an in-depth look at different district initiatives. Superintendent Shawn Bissetta said the forums are meant to ensure community members are aware of the great things going on in the district and the opportunities available to Canastota students.

"We want our kids to have every possible advantage to prepare them for what comes next," he said.

RSES, JSHS Join Positivity Project



Students and staff in grades 4-12 are excited to be able to participate in the Positivity Project this school year! The Positivity Project, founded in 2015, focuses on 24 character traits that are taught and reinforced throughout through the year discussions. activities and demonstrating them throughout the building.

Founders Jeff Bryan and Mike Irwin said their inspiration for the project came from one of their former college professors, Dr. Chris Peterson, a founder of the study of 'Positive Psychology.' Staff learned during their initial training that Dr. Peterson often began his college lectures by stating, "Anything that builds relationships between and among people is going to make you happy."

During September Superintendent's Conference Days, staff of RSES and JSHS completed training on the background of Positive Psychology and received access to the Positivity Project curriculum. Program resources include character cards, slideshows, video clips and interactive questions. Core committee members and building leaders from both schools demonstrated how to effectively use the resources and explained how to teach the core character traits throughout this school year. Activities and events are being planned in both buildings to help recognize character strengths in each other.

Students and staff at RSES and JSHS are excited to be able to start bringing more positivity to their schools and will share more about their successes as the year progresses.

The Canastota district created a new Coordinator of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion & Social Emotional Learning (DEI/SEL) position this year to support students, families and staff in their understanding of these important topics.

The district's primary goal in creating this role is to ensure it provides a safe learning environment for all students. Through the pandemic, staff and administrators have seen an increase in students struggling with mental health

issues, as well as other pandemic related issues. This role is vital to students, staff and Canastota families to help their overall well-being through the use of consistent, meaningful research-based educational practices.
