DISTRICT WELCOMES CONNECTED COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

Canastota is officially connected!

The district hosted a ribboncutting ceremony in May to formally announce its new partnership with Connected Community Schools, a Romebased organization that supports students and families by linking them with resources and local agencies.

"Being a partner with Connected Community Schools means that we now have the opportunity more than ever to give our students and our families a sense of hope. Hope that some of the challenges they're facing are not insurmountable challenges," Superintendent Shawn Bissetta said. "CCS is a huge part of our attempt to say, you know what, we're going to eliminate, as best we can, these distractors, these barriers to learning."

Canastota's CCS Site Coordinators have been working

FIRST AMBASSADOR CLASS JOINS INDUCTION WEEKEND FESTIVITIES



During this year's IBHOF Induction Weekend in June, 30 CHS students in the new Student Ambassador program had ringside seats to all the action.

The students completed a nine-month leadership development program offered jointly through the Canastota district's badging program and the International Boxing Hall of Fame. Through the program, they learned about the entertainment, sports marketing and hospitality industries and gained critical leadership and

communication skills.

Students put their skills and knowledge into action by spending the 4-day induction weekend volunteering as greeters, gift shop helpers, emcees, raffle and silent auction assistants and

membership booth staff. They had an opportunity to meet the inductees during a Friday luncheon at Theodore's, and they assisted with the banquet held at Turning

> Stone Event Center on Saturday. They also hosted an assembly at the high school with boxer Christy Martin, a member of the first class of female inductees to the IBHOE

As part of their preparations for induction weekend, Student Ambassadors spearheaded a fundraiser this spring to support Ukrainian children, due in part to their town's connection with two prominent Ukrainian boxers, the Klitschko brothers, who are both Hall of Fame members. Students announced that they raised nearly \$5,000 since April.

Not only has the appearance and functionality of the buildings been greatly enhanced, but the safety and security upgrades will make any inconvenience seem minor. From the enhanced security features, to the numerous infrastructure upgrades (new roofs, parking lots, bathrooms, etc.), to what is now frequently called the best home field in Section 3 (due to our stadium track and field renovations), we have an updated facility that will serve the needs of our community for years to come.

New Initiatives

year was a year of many instructional changes. This year, we will focus on refining our practices and settling into our shared, consistent approach to building and maintaining a top-notch core academic program.

Not only have we worked extensively on developing our academic intervention and Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) programming, but we've introduced programming that is unique to Canastota. We're also proud to announce that we are the host district for a Sports and Entertainment Management program (the only one in our region) offered in conjunction with Madison-Oneida BOCES, and that we continue to expand our Badging/ Micro-credentialing program to allow students to learn important skills valued by regional businesses and community organizations.
