# A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

As we head toward the holiday season, I'm incredibly excited to update you on some very important news impacting the school community. This time of year always brings a sense of excitement and anticipation of what is on the horizon – the dust has settled at the start of the new year, and we're fully focused on the important items that will define our 2023-24 school year.

Maintaining and enhancing our school facilities has been a major priority in recent years, with the completion of the nearly 26 million-dollar capital project in recent months. While we're pleased to have completed many safety, security, and efficiency upgrades to our schools, we're now fully focused on the proposed 30 million-dollar capital project that will go before Canastota voters on December 5th. The proposed project, in many respects, is an extension of the work that was started under the previous project, focusing heavily on safety upgrades while also maintaining the foundational infrastructure of our schools. Given the high aid rate that we qualify for through New York State and through the strategic use of our capital reserve funds, this project will not increase taxes to the Canastota community. I would encourage you to review our budget newsletter that was mailed several weeks ago and to review the information within this newsletter. As always, please contact the District Office with any questions

related to the project. Also, please join us for the Community Forum regarding the project on November 27th at 6:30 p.m.

Another initiative that will have a major impact on our school community is the impending "re-naming" of the school district that will unfold over the course of the next several months. Canastota. like many districts around the state, has been given the ultimatum from the State Education Department that we cannot continue to use the "Raiders" name. Given this reality, the District is committed to conducting a thorough and transparent process that will take into account the thoughts and ideas of our entire school community. In order to accomplish this task, the District has formed a Branding Advisory Committee comprised of students, alumni, employees, and community members that will facilitate the entire process from beginning to end. While the prospect of having to change our name has been upsetting to many people, I'm optimistic that we can use this process to unite for a common purpose, to use this as an opportunity to focus on what we are proud of and what unites us as a school community. Over the course of the next several months, the Branding Advisory Committee will be sending out updates as the process unfolds. 



### SPORTS MARKETING CLASS LEARNS ABOUT MARKET SEGMENTS

The Sports Marketing class is part of a two-year MOBOCES program, housed at CCSD. Students have recently been learning about marketing segmentation. A market segment is a subset of a large market based on demographics, needs, behavior, and location. This helps promoters plan how to advertise a specific sport or entertainment to fit the mold of the market segment.

A beginner activity that students worked on was "Market Man" where students used visuals to target people of a very specific market of their choosing.

On October 25th, representatives of the International Boxing Hall of Fame visited to show their marketing strategy. Prior to this visit, students brainstormed using the market segmentation strategies they learned, on how they believe the International Boxing Hall of Fame markets their venue (product). They were expected to share their brainstorms to the visitors and seek feedback.



During the two-year program, students will create, execute, and revise personalized workout plans tailored to individual client goals. Additionally, students will explore diverse career opportunities within the health industry.

### AN UPDATE ON E-SPORTS

The initiative to introduce E-Sports in our school has been an ongoing process since the announcement in the Fall Newsletter. We are thrilled to announce that we have made significant progress, and a demonstration event is scheduled tentatively for November 30th. This event aims to showcase the potential of E-Sports to our students and their families and provide them with a better understanding of what E-Sports is all about.

The introduction of E-Sports to CCSD is a crucial step for several reasons. Research has shown that 80% of students who engage in school E-Sports have never taken part in any school-sanctioned activity before. E-Sports provides an opportunity to include these students who are not typically interested in regular school sports and offer them something they can connect with, enjoy, and experience the same sense of team spirit. E-Sports is an all-inclusive activity that welcomes anyone to participate, regardless of their physical abilities.

In addition, E-Sports can help students acquire valuable soft skills that will help them in their future endeavors. Soft skills such as communication, teamwork, decision-making, and time management are essential skills that are highly valued by employers. E-Sports can help students develop these skills in a fun and engaging way. Moreover, E-Sports can help students explore various careers in the gaming industry, which is a 200-billion-dollar-a-year industry. Students can gain experience and develop skills that are highly valued in the gaming industry.

The pilot program that we plan to roll out during the second semester of this year at CCSD will provide students with a safe and monitored environment to explore their interests in the gaming industry. Research has shown that students who participate in E-Sports perform better in higher education. Many SUNY schools have already implemented E-Sports teams, and many schools now offer E-Sport scholarships to graduating seniors. By introducing E-Sports to CCSD, we hope to provide our students with another opportunity to excel academically and personally. Overall, we anticipate a high level of student interest in this program, and we look forward to seeing the positive impact that E-Sports will have on our students.

This activity taught the students the importance of perseverance and trying repeatedly until the desired outcome is achieved. They learned that things may not work out the first time, but with effort and persistence, success can be achieved.

mystery boxes for the students to investigate. The activity involved students partnering up and rotating through stations where each box contained a mystery item. The students were challenged to use their senses to guess what was inside the box without looking and had to write their guesses down on a list of 1-20. ### AN UPDATE FROM INNOVATIVE LEARNING AT CCSD



Seventeen Canastota High School students and Student Government officers attended the 2023 Leadership Workshop held in the High School Media Center on Thursday, October 26th. The Workshop events were coordinated and led by Elizabeth Garofalo, the CCSD Coordinator of Innovative Learning.

Jackie Starks and Deb Ford talked to the group about the various school community groups available in Canastota including the Engage Canastota Education Foundation, the CCSD Wall of Distinction, and the Canastota Alumni Association. Principal Peter Schultz and Superintendent Shawn Bissetta also spoke to the group about their role as leaders within the student community.

Liz Garofalo facilitated workshops on leadership and micro-credentialing, explaining to the students the many opportunities that are available to them in the area of work-based learning. Current partnerships include: International Boxing Hall of Fame, Syracuse Crunch, Greater Lenox Ambulance Service, Manufacturers Association of CNY (MACNY), Canastota Municipal Offices, as well as CCSD and community internship opportunities.

Students were given the opportunity to discuss concerns and issues within the school and to brainstorm leadership and legacy project ideas for further development. A classroom in the high school has been created to house the Canastota Center for Innovative Learning. This room has created a working space that will allow all students to participate in leadership workshops and activities throughout the school year.

Workshop activity ideas include: Resume Preparation, Job Interview Skills, Public Speaking, and Career Awareness.
